# Women and sex dolls

For this short study, I spoke to four women remotely on their use of male sex dolls.





As Dr Kate Devlin noted in her recent book Turned On: Science, Sex, and Robots, sex dolls tend to be associated with single men. But they are also frequently purchased by couples, people with disabilities, and parents whose adult children are socially excluded.

Once we examine women's use of sex dolls, we can begin to see people's use of them as emotional, creative and much more nuanced than the current negative stigma.

"His first bath was really moving for me. Ageing his face made me cry too. He was mine and no one else's. Matter of fact the grey hair I punched in with the black is actually my hair"

"When I finished Agare's modification and I was cleaning him, I cried then too, because this character, who is actually named after one of my imaginary friends when I was a child, was now manifested into a reality. It is like having my best friend in tangible form."

## They provide emotional support and companionship





"So my last relationship was about 6 almost 7 years now, was horrible. We started dating after being friends for years. The end of 2019 I had decided I was done with dating and was not interested in getting into a relationship with anyone, ever again. I am getting ready to turn 50 and just feel too old to try to keep playing the stupid game anymore. But I wanted companionship (not necessarily sex) but just someone here to care for"

## Women use their dolls as an expression and outlet for their fantasies

In a similar vein as video game avatars, dolls are personalised and given rich back-stories

"He has horns, pointed ears, pointed teeth and I widened his jawline to make him more manly. I also punched in black hair for his eyebrows and goatee. He has a very expensive long black wig. He also has custom made blue goat slit eyes. There are no other dolls like mine"



"Larry: WM 160 cm male doll, implanted eyebrows and mutton chop sideburns. Lazy hippie, center of attention, flirty, playful, naughty. Good listener, sensitive, empathetic, kind.

Lance: WM 160 cm male doll. Cowboy and hardworking mechanic. Sweet, shy, innocent, kind, empathetic, always willing to lend a hand.

Landon: WM 160 cm male doll. Biker and Victorianera vampire. Bad-boy, but with a good heart. Idolizes Larry." Pleasure and sex may of been their trigger to purchase but it can be a secondary use

"Of the other women I know who have these dolls, most of us have these dolls for companionship, someone to care about and care for. Sex in a possibility but not the reason we buy our dolls"

"I use them for companionship, having these presences in my life and home. Yes, I have had sex with both my male dolls but that is the least important thing they bring to my life. For many, they initially get these dolls for sex but then find a companion"

"They are my companions, I talk to them, kiss them and enjoy their presence in my life. Usually one of them sleeps in the bed and one is in the living room, while I work since I have the fortune to work from home."

## But women do not see their dolls as like humans

Their interaction with them is different from their human relationships, their interactions are a parallel form of intimacy. Their dolls supplement human relationships not replace them.

"They are not necessarily a human replacement, but a supplement"





"It is important that people see that these dolls are not just sex toys and that people who own them come from all walks of life. I love my dolls, they have made my life much more enjoyable, given me someone to care for and have made me very happy. Does it make me a deviant or weird? I don't know and honestly don't care. My friends and family know, and the only reason I am not more out about having the dolls is my career would be in jeopardy if it got out, because people are still not very understanding"

In the conclusion to her book Devlin said she doesn't envision mainstream appeal for sex dolls

"I lean more and more towards the opinion that the current hyper-realistic, hypersexualised gynoid is likely to constitute a small and niche market, most those who seek novelty," she wrote.

"Eventually there will be a male doll A.I., but these manufacturers cater primarily to men, so they are more focused on the female dolls. I do not really see much of a change with the male dolls, honestly"

# And they currently face very practical issues with their dolls

#### WEIGHT

"I am abnormally strong, considering my age and disability. I have deadlifted Xiel from the ground, hurt for days afterwards but I can do it. Most women cannot lift that much even if they are perfectly healthy. Manufacturers are going to have to address the weight issue if they want women to buy their dolls."

#### OVERLY SEXUAL OR UNAPPEALING IMAGE

"The second issue, and probably the reason it took me so long to decide to get a doll is the pictures are overly sexualized. I have told more then one vendor that has a bunch of pictures of the doll naked and standing in sexually explicit poses is actually a turnoff for a lot of women."

#### LACK OF CHOICE

"The selection of male dolls really sucks. The variety of bodies is even worse, hopped up on steroids torsos but skinny arms and legs. The male dolls are various degrees of effeminate males or really masculine female faces. Most of the bodies are what men think women consider attractive, and they are not."
